The Pope Took Her in His Arms

Consuelo Cordoba was determined to die. Her face was disfigured after a vicious attack; she had undergone surgery a hundred times. Yet for over 16 years she had great courage and helped other victims of violence.

Then a brain ailment led her to wish to die “to put an end to suffering.” Euthanasia was scheduled for Sept. 29, 2017. Nevertheless, she wanted to receive the Pope’s blessing first to “be able to rest in peace.” She was able to contact Pope Francis during his visit to Columbia

“And then he saw me and made a sign to me, like this,” she said, her left arm reaching forward.

“I said to myself: ‘Thank you God, because he is coming for me.’” The Pope took her in his arms and blessed her, putting his right hand on her head and convinced her to continue to live.

“There won’t be euthanasia,” affirmed Consuelo in front of the television cameras.

It was difficult for her to speak, her head covered with a mask, her left eye bandaged. But her right eye was beaming bright with new hope and determination to live for God, until he called her home by a natural death.
